

1.DAY - SPLIT

Split is the second largest city in Croatia, with just over 200,000 inhabitants, and is the largest city on the Adriatic coast. Once merely considered by some as just transit point – with excellent transport connections by bus, sea, air and train, it's easy to travel to and from the city – it is deservedly becoming a destination in its own right.

There are some fantastic sights in the city, both Roman and more modern, excellent options for dining, drinking and nightlife, plenty of beach opportunities and lots of choice for everybody.

2.DAY - HVAR

Gently rolling hills painted a brilliant purple by the fertile flowers, lush vineyards nestling at the foot of ragged mountains, gorgeous beaches with tiny inlets and secluded coves, luscious restaurants, boutiques, and a vibrant nightlife amidst the medieval streets of Hvar Town are just a few of the treats to enjoy on this dream of an island.

Imposing fortifications hover above the fluid blend of grey stone and orange cascading roofs. The remains of walls built by a long list of invaders descend towards the wide promenade edging the brilliant blue sea and the quaint fishing harbor. Marble streets reveal one of the largest squares in Dalmatia, Trg Sveti Stjepana as well as the prized Cathedral of St. Stjepan and the Renaissance theatre.

Hvar Town may be the most stunning town on the island but Stari Grad, the oldest village on the island, and Jelsa, as well as a smattering of small villages, dotting the coast or nestled in the lush interior are well worth a visit.

3.DAY - VIS

Of all the inhabited Croatian islands, Vis is the furthest from the coast and the most enigmatic. It spent much of its recent history serving as a Yugoslav military base, cut off from foreign visitors from the 1950s right up until 1989. This isolation preserved the island from development and drove much of the population to move elsewhere in search of work, leaving it underpopulated for many years.

International and local travellers alike now flock to Vis, seeking authenticity, nature, gourmet delights and peace and quiet. That's only set to increase following the 2018 release of the movie Mamma Mia! Here We Go Again, filmed on the island.

4.DAY - LASTOVO

Separated from the crowded hotspots of Croatian tourism, smaller islands are embracing those who wish peace and quiet on their vacation. We bring you three reasons to visit Lastovo island, located in the nautical vicinity of Korcula, yet far enough to provide a calm holiday in a vibrant Mediterranean setting .

Also, if you can't imagine your holiday without romantic sceneries, the night skies above Lastovo will certainly leave a lasting impression on you. Because the island is so far away from dense urban centers, the light emitted in the air is very scarce, causing the nights to be darker, and stars brighter.

5.DAY - KORČULA

The Island Of Korčula (pronounced Kor-chu-la) the so called birth home of Marco Polo, is one of the greenest islands in the Adriatic sea. Like most of the Croatian islands, the Greeks, who gave it the name Korkyra Melaina or 'Black Corfu' for its dark and densely wooded appearance, first settled here.

The island itself is rich in art and culture, as well as beautiful nature. It features numerous secluded beaches and bays, small and uninhabited Archipelago consisting of sixteen islets as well as breathtaking views from the top of the hills.

6.DAY - MLJET

Mljet is the first larger island one come upon while sailing the Croatian Adriatic from the direction from south to north. It is Croatia's greenest island with its Mediterranean vegetation, clear and clean sea, gentle sandy shoreline and a wealth of underwater sea life. The island is considered to be one of the most beautiful of the Croatian islands too.

7.DAY - DUBROVNIK

George Bernard Shaw once wrote "Those who seek paradise on earth should come to Dubrovnik". Dubrovnik is a soulful and charming city, a treasure chest of historical and cultural masterpieces, officially recognized as World Cultural Heritage. Dubrovnik Old Town is surrounded with city walls that were built in the 900s and are almost 2km long.

Symphony Orchestra, concert halls, art galleries, museums – Dubrovnik has a lot to offer for those culturally interested. Dubrovnik was also the main filming location in Croatia for King's Landing, a fictional city in Game of Thrones series. For those who have seen the series, Dubrovnik will feel like a beautiful déjà vu.
